It is a title that speaks of compassion and heartbreak in the wake of the terrible cost of war.


And it is a title that speaks of love of country, and of a belief in America's goodness, and our strength.

He became his mother's bouncing baby boy on June 27, 1955 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, .

He joined the Army on July 25, 1977 where he served ten years, with two overseas tours in Germany, the first in Frankfurt and the second in Bamberg. He was honorably discharged from United States Army on August 26, 1987.

He chaired the Monterey County Chapter of the American Civil Liberty Union (ACLU) from February of 1997 to February of 1999.

He taught as a part-time as a faculty member at the Monterey Peninsula College from the fall term of 1997 to the summer term of 2000. He taught two courses, which were "Inter-Cultural Relations in America Society," and "African Americans in American Government."

He has a master's in Public Administration from Golden Gate University, a Bachelor of Art in Social Science from San Jose State University, and an Associate's from Monterey Peninsula College.

From January 6, 2007 to January 2009, He was president of the newly inaugurated Monterey County Branch of the NAACP (The Seaside Branch, and the Salinas Branch were emerged).

He worked at the Monterey County Office of the Military & Veterans Affairs as Military & Veterans Services Representative III for twelve years. He retired from the Monterey County Office of the Military & Veterans on July 7, 2018. Since retirement he is now a full-time artist where his artwork is displayed at Monterey Peninsula Art Foundation's Co-op Gallery at 425 Cannery Row.
